Lobbying tips

□ Know who your legislators are: This can be learned by calling your local county assessor or through the State Legislative website: https://www.legis.iowa.gov/legislators.
☐ Make contact with your legislators: They are more likely to listen to individuals from their own districts that can either help or harm them in an election. Legislators will pay attention to those who contact them because very few constituents do during a session.
□ Develop a relationship with your legislators: Get email addresses and phone numbers for your legislators and keep in regular contact through email during the session, or meet for coffee before session begins or on the weekends when legislators are home.
□ Keep at it: If a legislator is hostile or non-responsive to your issue, keep contacting him or her.
$\hfill \Box$ Get active: If a legislator is against your position, find a new candidate to run against him or her.
□ Stay informed: Each weekend legislators hold forums during the session. Attend these when possible to ask questions and stay informed.

BITTERSWEET HARVEST

The Bracero Program 1942-1964



The Emergency Farm Labor Program, more familiarly known as the Bracero Program, enabled approximately 2 million Mexicans to enter the United States and work on short-term labor contracts. Bittersweet Harvest: The Bracero Program, 1942-1964 explores the braceros' undeniable contributions to communities in Mexico and the United States, the opportunities that became available to braceros and the challenges that they faced as guest workers during the war years and afterward.

Bittersweet Harvest: The Bracero Program 1942-1964 was developed by the Smithsonian's National Museum of American History and circulated by the Smithsonian Institution Traveling Exhibition Service. This exhibition received Federal support from the Latino Initiatives Pool, administered by the Smithsonian Latino Center.
